Alfred Edersheim: A Brief Biography



The written labors of Alfred Edersheim have had a profound impact on Bible teachers for over a century; however, his personal life has been shrouded in obscurity. A Jewish convert to true biblical Christianity, he now stands as one of the foremost Hebrew Christian scholars in the history of the Church. This article will provide a brief biography of this unique and gifted believer and will investigate the dynamics that produced such an outstanding scholar of the Old and New Testaments. It will also provide an extensive chronological list of his literary works.

Millions of Bible teachers, pastors and students have benefited from Edersheim's awesome accomplishments in biblical research. Mentioning his name is often associated with depth and trustworthiness in biblical backgrounds and the study of the life of Jesus Christ. A first-class scholar who was a lecturer at Oxford University, he also spent many years as a pastor of congregations in Scotland and England and served in Jewish evangelism in Romania. Even more than a century since his books were first published, many of them are still reprinted on a regular basis and regarded as standard sources by Bible scholars and theologians. Simply speaking, Alfred Edersheim has become a well~established "household" name in the world of biblical studies. His magnum opus, *The Life and Times of Jesus the Messiah* published in 1882, is still unparalleled and unsurpassed and stands as the finest work on the subject after I 10 years!

With these outstanding accomplishments and his impact now continuing into a second century, several questions arise: Who was Alfred Edersheim? What was his background? Where did he minister? How did he acquire such an astounding
